






Key Statistics

Working on Fire is an Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) aimed at providing poverty and income relief through work opportunities. Programme resides under and is funded by the Department Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment. Through the Programme, young men and women are trained to become skilled participants to implement Integrated Fire Management services and products and they are deployed across the country to reduce the personal and economic harm caused by unwanted wildfire.

Working on Fire recruits and trains young men and women from across South Africa with a strong focus on the marginalized communities and people with disabilities.


Gender Distribution



The Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) has won a bronze award for the successful implementation of youth empowerment policies.

Deputy Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure, Noxolo Kiviet, mentioned Working on Fire as one of the Expanded Public Works Programmes that were building a core of young people who have skills in various fields of infrastructure development and environmental management when she accepted the Future Policy Bronze Award 2019.

South Africa's Expanded Public Works Programme received the award – for its role in promoting youth economic empowerment – at the Future Policy Awards 2019 ceremony held in Belgrade, Serbia, on 16 October.

During her acceptance speech, the Deputy Minister said government aims to have five million more youth as beneficiaries of the EPWPs and mentioned how South African youth core skills came to the rescue of Canada when WOF's firefighters were deployed to Canada to assist with firefighting operations. Fireifghters receive high praise after Canada deployment

WOF receives praises from Canada and South Africa after its fourth deployment to Canada. The Programme was previously deployed in 2015, 2016, and 2019. A total of 109 firefighters and management left South Africa on 10 August 2021 for the province of Manitoba, Canada, and spent 34 days assisting with firefighting efforts.

They were welcomed back on home soil on 16 September 2021 with high praises and recognition from Canadian authorities and here at home. The High Commissioner of Canada to South Africa, Christopher Cooter, said: "You made sacrifices to be away from your loved ones and risked your lives in fighting these wildfires. I know the people of Manitoba, Canada, and the communities at large are grateful and appreciate your efforts and the team spirit you showed as evidenced by your singing and chanting upon your return."

Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment, Barbara Creecy, said: "I extend my deepest gratitude and appreciation to the WOF team returning home from a successful firefighting mission in Canada, Manitoba. The praise for your professionalism and high-performance standards expressed by Canadian authorities is indicative of the success of the WOF Programme and its capabilities in Integrated Fire Management over the past 18 years. The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment, the Expanded Public Works Programme, and indeed South Africa share in this proud moment with all of you and welcome back home."
